KCC Daily Devotion

Monday: (Mark 2:13–17) Jesus boldly called Levi, a tax collector despised by society, to follow Him. The Pharisees criticized, but Jesus answered with truth: He came for sinners, not the righteous. His strength was seen in His compassion for the outcast. Ask yourself: are we welcoming people into God's grace like Jesus, or are we shutting doors like the Pharisees? Bold faith embraces the broken. Let's follow His example, loving those others reject, and living unashamedly for His mission. Father, help us love better. In Jesus, amen. **Tuesday**: (Mark 2:18–22) When challenged about fasting, Jesus explained that His presence was cause for joy, not ritual mourning. He boldly declared that new wine needs new wineskins. His kingdom was not bound by empty tradition. Jesus stood firm against religious pressure, revealing His authority to redefine spiritual life. Do we cling to traditions like the Pharisees, or embrace Christ's new life? Let's boldly welcome the freshness of His Spirit, choosing relationship with Him over ritual without heart. Lord, we get more hung up on traditions than we do truly following you. Lead us, Lord. In Jesus, amen. Wednesday: (Mark 2:23–28) The Pharisees accused Jesus' disciples of breaking the Sabbath by picking grain. Jesus responded with bold truth: the Sabbath was made for man, not man for the Sabbath. He proclaimed Himself "Lord of the Sabbath," showing His divine authority. This confrontation revealed His strength to stand against legalism. Are we more concerned with rules or with the Lord Himself? Let's imitate Jesus, honoring God's Word with compassion and freedom rather than using it to condemn others. Father, may we become more concerned with truth and bringing the lost to Your saving grace than we are our traditions. Help us get out of the way. In Jesus, amen. **Thursday**: (Mark 3:1–6) Jesus entered the synagogue where a man with a shriveled hand stood. The Pharisees watched, waiting to accuse. Boldly, Jesus asked, "Is it lawful to do good or evil on the Sabbath?" He healed the man, showing mercy is greater than ritual. His strength confronted hypocrisy directly, even though it led to plots against Him. Ask yourself this: do we stand boldly for compassion, or hide behind appearances? Father, help us courageously act in love, even when it costs us. Help us not care what humans say or think. Build us up so that we realize we are only here to serve You. In Jesus name, amen. Friday: Across these controversies in Mark 2:13 - 3:6, Jesus never avoided conflict. Instead, He met it with truth, compassion, and courage. His boldness exposed hardened hearts, while revealing God's mercy to the broken. Opposition didn't silence Him—it sharpened His mission. When challenged, do we shrink back like Pharisees clinging to control, or stand firm like Jesus declaring truth in love? Bold faith doesn't avoid tough questions; it shines light into darkness. Let us reflect His strength in our daily witness. Shine, Jesus, shine. Shine through my actions more than my words. In Jesus name, amen. Saturday: Mark shows Jesus as strong, bold, and unafraid to challenge empty religion. He loved people more than rules and truth more than approval. Are we more like Jesus or the Pharisees? Do we stand boldly for what's right, or seek comfort in traditions? Following Jesus means living courageously, even when misunderstood. God, help us get out of our own way. In Jesus name, amen
